Vista Charter School Passage Charter School

Program Description: Passage Charter School (PCS) and Vista Charter School (VCS) are Alternative Education Campuses (AECs), chartered by the Montrose County School District (MCSD) as dropout retrieval schools for students in Montrose, Delta, and Ouray counties. PCS formed in 1999 to serve pregnant and parenting students, aged 14-21. VCS formed in 1987 and serves students who are 16-21 years of age. Many have become disenfranchised from traditional schools.

In order to reduce dropout rates and increase graduation and completion rates, and strengthen engagement levels and postsecondary and workforce readiness, PCS and VCS are collaborating to: 1) increase enrollment at both schools by 20% in 2016-2017 through hiring of a bilingual Outreach/Reengagement Coordinator to contact schools about dropouts and then visit with these potential students; and use of increased advertising and social media; 2) improve attendance and reduce dropout rates at both schools through enhanced curriculum and services, dual enrollment with Colorado Mesa University and Western State Colorado University, mental health counseling, and family engagement; and 3) improve academic achievement through hiring of Individual Career and Academic Planning staff to analyze data, research curriculum, and revise Unified Improvement Plans (UIPs).
