PROMISING PRACTICES

Spellbinders Storytellers mission is to use the art of oral storytelling to enhance literacy, encourage character development, and build intergenerational community. Denver Public Schools' Storytelling program brings together young and old to create connections, advance literacy, and enrich the lives of children and volunteers alike.

Oral storytellers volunteer in classrooms – telling, not reading stories. Tellers provide 20 to 40-minute storytelling sessions based on the needs of the teacher. Tellers return each month so that children form long-term relationships with caring community members. Storytellers offer a fun, engaging, and effective tool for literacy skill building.

Listening and speaking are core skills that cross all content areas. Oral storytelling requires students to visualize and imagine. This supports reading comprehension and evokes critical thinking skills which are essential to all higher learning. Stories include tales from around the world that expand a child's worldview.

The program is evaluated by surveying teachers at the end of the school year. Approximately 98% of teachers report that having a Spellbinders storyteller in the classroom helps students achieve academic goals.

RESEARCH BRIEF

A couple of months ago, the <u>National Association for Family, School, and Community Engagement</u> (NAFSCE) published a new guidance document: <u>Family Engagement Core Competencies</u>: A Body of Knowledge, Skills, and Dispositions for Family-Facing Professionals.

Based on over 3 years of research with the field, the Family Engagement Core Competencies bring together the knowledge, skills, and dispositions that family facing professionals develop and embrace to engage families equitably. The goal of the Core Competencies is to enhance, unify, and amplify the standards documents and guidance that address family and community engagement in various fields and developmental periods to advance and support more effective and universal practice. The competencies are:

- 1. Respect, Honor, and Value Families.
- 2. Embrace Equity Throughout Family Engagement.
- 3. Build Trusting Reciprocal Relationships with Families.
- 4. Foster Community Partnerships for Learning and Family Wellbeing.
- 5. Co-Construct Learning Opportunities with Families.
- 6. Link Family and Community Engagement to Learning and Development.
- 7. Take Part in Lifelong Learning.
- 8. Advocate for Systems Change

NAFSCE is <u>hosting a webinar</u> on September 15 from 11-12 MDT to walk people through the Competencies.

SAC/DAC ON TRACK

On August 25, parents and staff from across Colorado joined the bi-monthly SAC/DAC Networking meeting. And we had an amazing conversation!

The session started with a brief overview of <u>SAC</u> and <u>DAC</u> legislated responsibilities. Participants then engaged in a conversation about recruitment, communication and how to "demystify" accountability committees.

Attendees at the meeting all shared a goal; they want accountability committee meetings to be welcoming and not overwhelming. They shared that it's difficult to recruit members when the topics seem so daunting. CDE staff recom-

mended balancing what needs to be discussed with having fun. The legislated responsibilities won't happen if you're struggling to recruit committee members or if families don't feel that they have a voice.

Parent leaders offered several suggestions about how to use social media to engage SAC/DAC members as well as the broader school community, while also remaining positive and productive.
