When School's Out: Child Nutrition Options for Kids



The Afterschool Snack Program (ASP), the Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) Afterschool Program, and the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) are all federal child nutrition programs that can be utilized to provide nutritious meals and snacks to children outside of regular school time. In Colorado, the ASP and SFSP are administered by the Colorado Department of Education and the CACFP Afterschool Program is administered by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. To assist operators in identifying programmatic differences, the chart below outlines the basic requirements of each program.

Program Eligibility	 Operate the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and/or School Breakfast Program (SBP). Non area-eligible: The school has less than 50% of students eligible for free or reduced price meals. Snacks must be counted and claimed based upon the child's approved eligibility. Snacks are reimbursed at the free, reduced and paid rate. Snack priced for full paid children must be approved by the School Nutrition Unit and the maximum reduced price charge is \$0.15. 	 Area-eligible: Located in the attendance area of a school where at least 50% of students are eligible for free or reduced price meals under the National School Lunch Program. Site eligibility is valid for five years from the determination date. 	 Area-eligible: Site located in area where 50% or more of the children are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals using school or census data. Required for open sites; option for closed-enrolled sites. Site eligibility is valid for five years from the determination date. Non area-eligible: Option for closed-enrolled sites as long as half of the kids enrolled are eligible for free or reduced price school meals determined by income eligibility applications. Camp sites: Camps are reimbursed for meals served to children eligible for free or reduced-price school meals determined by income eligibility applications. Migrant sites: Certification by a migrant organization that the sites serve children of migrant farm workers. Site eligibility is valid for one year from the
