These alternate modes of access are auditory, multi-sensory, tactile, and visual.</li> <li>Response Accommodations —Allow students to complete activities, assignments, and assessments in different ways or to solve or organize problems using some type of assistive device or organizer.</li> <li>Setting Accommodations —Change the location in which a test or assignment is given or the conditions of the assessment setting.</li> <li>Timing and Scheduling Accommodations —Increase the allowable length of time to complete an assessment or assignment and perhaps change the way the time is organized.</li> <li>Linguistic Accommodations — Allow English language learners (ELLs) to access academic construct measured by reducing the linguistic load of an assessment.
